

Burton Community Park Renewal

There was a really great turnout on Tuesday, September 16, at the Hall, as Quinn Howard of Urban Systems presented two concepts for the renewal of the Burton Community Park (McCormack Park). On hand, representing the Columbia Basin Trust, were Amanda Murphy, Community Liaison, and Ulli Mueller, Senior Manager, Delivery of Benefits. Teresa Weatherhead represented RDCK while Karey Bilodeau and BCA members were in attendance and also helped with refreshments (*thank you*).

The goal of the project is to update existing facilities to create a multi-generational gathering space and inclusive park that is welcoming to everyone. The Columbia Basin Trust has been supporting the design and facilitation costs to ensure Burton has a detailed park plan that will direct the next phase of the project.

To begin the evening, Quinn outlined the work done

to date from information gleaned at meetings held with key players over the last year, and presented two concepts (see images). These were posted on presentation boards, and printed out with copies placed on each table. The idea was to involve community. Participants were invited to place stickers on the boards and write comments, suggestions, approvals and more.

Areas addressed included: storage, shade, a multi-sport court, playground, baseball field and facilities, access, parking, forest paths, community hall entrance, pump track, memorial area, swings, zip line, and a new activity, started this summer, of a Community Fridge for food distribution.

Urban Systems also presented several conceptual images of what structures in the park could look like.

At the time of this Busy-Beeline publication Urban Systems is still reviewing all the data ready for **Phase 3, to prioritize possibilities and build the vision.**



Way to go Burton Elementary!

On Tuesday, September 24, 41 students from Burton Elementary took to the streets and ran or walked for Terry Fox. Accompanied by teachers and Principal Tim Van Brummelen, the students circled the Burton Loop, some managing three times round. As each student reached the final intersection Mr. Van Brummelen gave each a 'high five' in salute for success. Some ran full steam for the final stretch, some walked slowly, but they each succeeded. **Way to go!**

Which brings to mind the story of Terry Fox who is considered a Canadian hero, a courageous and dynamic young man who began his Marathon of Hope

across Canada in 1980 to raise awareness for cancer. Between the Marathon of Hope of 1980 and the following year, Terry raised over \$23 million (equivalent of over \$73 million today) for cancer research. That year, on September 21, 1981, to commemorate Terry and continue his legacy, Isadore Sharp and the Fox Family initiated the first Terry Fox Run in communities across Canada, and now around the world.

Forty-four years later, 41 children of Burton Elementary continued that legacy—**Way to go!**

Recipes

Submitted

End of season simple salad

Cucumber and Tomato

Green onion tops or chives

1-1.5 T Feta cheese crumbled

Peel and chop cucumber into small pieces. Chop tomato into same size pieces. Chop green onion into 1/4" slices.

Mix ingredients and add feta cheese, a little olive oil, salt and pepper.

(Alternate: avocado works well; chopped parsley and/or basil add lovely flavour.)

Serve in small bowl or put on top of lettuce leaves. A great way to use up those last cucumbers and fresh tomatoes.

German Stew

3-5 potatoes cut to 1" cubes

1/4 - 1/2 onion chopped

Clove of garlic minced

Butter and olive oil.

1/3 - 1/2 ring of smoked sausage

1 cup cooked green beans

Flour for thickening

In large pot sauté onions in butter and olive oil until transparent.

Add potatoes and enough water to cover. Simmer 10 minutes.

Cut sausage into half rounds 5/8" thick and add.

After 5 minutes add green beans.

Add flour to thicken and bring back up to boil.

Serve in a bowl with a bun or salad on the side.

A nice filling and quick dinner.

Dawn, who originally hails from Yellowknife, NWT, can often be found at Burton Elementary School, or volunteering with the fire brigade or community garden. “I am a mum, first and foremost,” says Dawn, who is the mother of five children aged 7½ to 21.

Her parents moved to Nakusp and Dawn enjoyed visiting family there. “We loved the beauty of the area, so we decided to move here, and found acreage. We quite enjoy living here.”

At first, Dawn's children were travelling from Burton by bus to school in Nakusp. Meanwhile, a group of parents in the area, who were part of the StrongStart program (a free, early learning drop-in program for children aged 0-5 and their caregivers) decided that it would be good to get their chil-

dren into the Burton Elementary School. It was then that Burton Elementary was re-opened and received its first 12 students, some coming from Fauquier and Edgewood. There are now 41 students and Dawn can be found at the school most days, volunteering, doing the hot lunches, and helping children prepare snacks from the fruits and vegetables harvested from the Bee Happy Garden and market.

One of Dawn's roles includes being a part of the Parent Advisory Council (PAC). “It would be awesome to see more parents with PAC, and coming to the school more often. Before Covid we had parents in the classrooms volunteering, and they can now - they are free to come and go. My older kids have come to volunteer. Kids love having parental help.”
